HEALTH & SAFETY POLICY

2-June 2022

Purpose

The health, safety, and welfare of landowners and their guests, as well as contractors undertaking work for the Society, are important to the Tern Point Recreation & Conservation Society ("the Society").

The Society will strive for excellence in health and safety management on behalf of our community, and to meet legislative requirements around Health & Safety in the Workplace.

Scope

Landowners, their families and guests, and contractors employed by the Society who are lawfully visiting Tern Point.

Activity undertaken in/on areas defined as Tern Point 'Common Areas' or 'Common Land' – including the Tern Point Roading network, the Farm, Olive Grove, Village Green/Wetland, defined Walking Tracks, Boatshed/Boat Ramp, 'The Park' recreational area and the Conservation Areas on our boundaries with the Mangawhai Estuary and Wildlife Refuge.

Content

- It is the policy of the Society, so far as is reasonably practicable, to protect the health, safety and welfare of all owners and guests, and other people who are lawfully visiting Tern Point. We will act in compliance with our legal obligations, including relevant New Zealand standards and codes of practice.
- 2. The Society aims to effectively manage hazards and risks on Common Land, arising from its facilities and activities. In particular, the Society will:
 - a) Strive to provide and maintain a safe environment for owners, guests, and contractors working for the Society that is safe and without risk to health;
 - b) provide such information, instruction, training, and supervision as is necessary, to ensure that health and safety hazards and risks are identified, understood and managed effectively;
 - establish health and safety objectives which will be reviewed each year through an internal audit process to ensure continuous improvement in health and safety management;
 - d) require accurate reporting, notification and investigation of all injuries and incidents.
- 3. All members of the Society have obligations to:
 - a) report any incidents and injuries occurring on Common Land as soon as practical after the event;
 - b) report any identified risks to health and safety of owners, guests, customers, or other lawful visitors, to the Society's Committee;
 - c) not engage in any activity on Common Land that could potentially put others at risk.
- 4. The Society's health and safety performance will be monitored and reviewed by:
 - a) The Society's Committee at each scheduled committee meeting;
 - b) an annual health and safety performance report to the Society's AGM, including goal setting and achievements, policy reviews, significant events, and corrective actions.

Background Notes:

The new Health & Safety at Work Act 2015 took effect on Monday 4 April 2016. Under the legislation, because of its responsibility for work undertaken on common land within the subdivision, the Tern Point Recreation & Conservation Society Incorporated is a PCBU (Person Conducting a Business or Undertaking). The buildings and structures on our Common Land (Maintenance Shed, Pump Shed and Boatshed) will qualify as a Workplace.

The Society has a duty to do what it can, within its influence and control, to ensure the health and safety of workers and people affected by its work. The Act requires due diligence on the part of the Society's manager and elected committee to ensure the Society is meeting its health and safety obligations.

The Society also has a duty to visitors and any casual volunteers working on the Common Land (ie Working Bees or Olive Picking) to ensure their health and safety is not put at risk, so far as is reasonably practicable.

Contractors engaged by the Society are also obligated under the Act to take reasonable care and follow reasonable instruction while working at Tern Point.

The following areas of risk have been identified and mitigation strategies, in place or proposed, are outlined:

Contractors should have information provided in writing when they are engaged and volunteers given a verbal briefing at commencement of work.

Conservation Areas	 Walking tracks often blocked by fallen acacia 	Periodic working bees to clear tracks.	Verbal briefings required before working bees. If volunteers are using chainsaws, we need to ensure they have suitable protection (headgear, chaps, etc)
